
TIPS TO AVOID

Some scammers will pose as utility workers or contractors affiliated with your electric utility by knocking on your door and claiming to be employed or hired by the utility company. They may claim they were hired to reset, repair, replace or inspect your electric meter or other utility-related device. If a utility employee or authorized contractor needs access to your home, we will schedule an appointment in advance, and proper identification will be provided for your review.


How Extreme Summer Temps Impact Reliability:

When outdoor temperatures soar, our electricity use increases. That's because our air conditioners are running longer and more often to counteract sweltering outdoor temperatures. Factor in that we all tend to use electricity at the same times—in the morning and early evenings—and that equals a lot of strain on our electric grid.

At Consumers Energy, we work closely with Central Iowa Power Cooperative, or CIPCO, our local generation and transmission (G&T) cooperative in resource and infrastructure planning to ensure you have the power you need whenever you flip a switch, but the electric grid is much larger than your local co-op and G&T.

In summer months, when even more electricity is being used simultaneously across the country, it is possible for electricity demand to exceed supply, especially if a prolonged heat wave occurs. If this happens, which is rare, the grid operator for our region of the country may call on electricity users to actively reduce their energy use or initiate rolling power outages to relieve pressure on the grid. Consumers Energy will always keep you informed about situations like this.

We work proactively with our G&T to create a resilient portion of the grid and ensure electric reliability in extreme weather, including regular system maintenance, grid modernization efforts, and disaster response planning; but it takes everyone to keep the grid reliable.



To help keep the air conditioner running for you, your family, and your neighbors, here are a few things you can do to relieve pressure on the grid during times of extreme summer heat:

- Select the highest comfortable thermostat setting and turn it up several degrees whenever possible. Your cooling system must run longer to make up the difference between the thermostat temp and the outdoor temp.
- Seal air leaks around windows and exterior doors with caulk and weatherstripping. Air leaks and drafts force your cooling system to work harder than necessary.
- Run major appliances such as dishwashers, ovens, and dryers during off-peak hours when the demand for electricity is lower. Start the dishwasher before you go to bed.
- Use ceiling fans to make yourself feel a few degrees cooler. Remember, ceiling fans cool people (not rooms), so turn them off in unoccupied rooms. During summer months, set ceiling fan blades to rotate counterclockwise, which pushes cool air down for a windchill effect.
- Close blinds, curtains, and shades during the hottest part of the day to block unwanted heat gain from sunlight. Consider blackout curtains with thermal backing or reflective lining to block heat and light.
- Use smaller appliances, such as slow cookers, air fryers, and toaster ovens to cook meals. Studies have shown that air fryers use about half the amount of electricity than a full-sized oven. Air fryers are smaller and use focused heat, which results in faster cooking times, less heat output, and lower energy use.

As we face the challenges posed by soaring summer temperatures, understanding the impact on energy demand is crucial for maintaining a reliable power supply. By adopting energy conservation practices during periods of extreme heat, not only can you save money on your electric bills, but you can also contribute to the resilience of the grid, keeping our local community cool and connected.



Annual Audit of Co-op Financials Complete

In March, Eide Bailly LLP completed the Annual Audit of the balance sheet of Consumers Energy Cooperative and Subsidiary as of December 31, 2024, and 2023, and the related statements of operations, member patronage capital credits, and other equities and cash flows for the years then ended. The audits were conducted according to the generally accepted auditing standards.

An audit facilitates improved processes and controls, addresses regulatory or other compliance issues, and ensures processes are efficient as well as providing reasonable assurance the financial statements are presented fairly and are free of material misstatement. Eide Bailly LLP's Brady Cross, CPA, Audit Manager, presented a clean opinion to the Board of Directors at their April board meeting, stating that the financial statements are in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. The financial statements for Consumers Energy will be presented to the membership at the Annual Meeting on Thursday evening, August 21, 2025.



Nominating Committee's Duties:

Develop Slate of Candidates for Election of Directors & Post Nominations

This year's Nominating Committee members are Merrell Kilborn, Mona Kilborn, Becky McKibben, Loyd Nelson, Autumn Ogden, Carman Rosburg, Lee Tesdell, and Russ Yarrow. The Nominating Committee is comprised of 5 to 11 cooperative members that are appointed by the Board of Directors and charged with the responsibility of selecting members for director candidate positions annually.

The committee met on April 29 to develop a slate of candidates to run for Consumers Energy's Board of Directors. The election of three directors will be held at the Annual Meeting on Thursday, August 21, 2025, at 6:00 p.m.

In July, the Nominating Committee will finalize the ballot for the director election and post its list of nominations for director candidates at Consumers Energy by July 7. Cooperative members have the ability to petition candidates on the ballot as stated in the cooperative's By-Laws as follows:

The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least forty-five (45) days before the meeting a list of nominations for directors.

Such nominations shall be made by districts as herein prescribed to succeed the directors whose terms will expire at the meeting of members for which such nominations are made, and the members so nominated shall be bona fide residents of the district from which they are nominated and meet all other qualification requirements as set forth herein. Any fifty (50) or more members may make other nominations in writing over their signatures not less than thirty-five (35) days prior to the meeting at which directors are to be elected, and the secretary shall post the same at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted; such nominations so made by such members to be subject to the same qualifications, district, and residence requirements as nominations by the nominating committee heretofore prescribed.

Each co-op member will receive information on the director candidates in the Annual Meeting Notice and Ballot Mailing to be mailed in early August.

This Nominating Committee will serve as the Election & Credentials Committee for the 2025 Election of Directors at the Annual Meeting. The committee appointed Loyd Nelson as chairperson and Becky McKibben as vice chairperson. Sincere gratitude is extended to these committee members for their dedicated service to Consumers Energy and its membership.


